# Recreational Sport Management

The recreational sport specialization prepares students to assume leadership positions in all types of participatory sports programs – focusing on the management of people and resources in recreational sports while also providing students with a skill set to work in a variety of settings in the sport continuum. Through class practica, projects, internship opportunities, and field experiences, students learn leadership, management, programming, marketing and evaluation, legal aspects of sport, and communication skills. The Recreational Sport Management Club is a student club that promotes the professional development of its majors and sponsors guest speakers, social activities, field trips, and other events.

## Career possibilities include:

- Amateur Athletics with AAU and state games across the country
- Business/industrial sports providing opportunities for a sport programmer in employee recreational sports. There are over 150,000 job opportunities available in approximately 50,000 corporations and industries which spend more than \$3 billion a year on recreation for their employees
- The collegiate setting , which offers career opportunities in informal sports, instructional sports, intramural sports, club sports and fitness programming on college and university campuses across the country
- Commercial sports, with positions in such settings as theme parks, health/fitness spas, racquet clubs, and hotels
- Military recreation, with positions worldwide for sport programmers and sport directors in intramural, extramural, informal and club sports are available on all types of military bases--Air Force, Army, Navy and Marine
- Municipal parks and recreation departments, which offer positions in sports programming as many of their recreational offerings are sports related.
- Resort/tourism settings, which offer specialized opportunities in sports to include facility management, programming and operation
- Non-profit agencies, including YMCA's/YWCA's and Boys' and Girls' Clubs, with recreational sport related job opportunities in positions such as sports coordinators and program director
